



This wonderful reference book was first published in 1950 and the latest edition was published in 2006. A book that has been in more or less constant reprint for almost 60 years tells you something about the need for such a reference and its ability to meet a continuous demand.


At first sight the book looks a little daunting at over 600 pages, but don't be put off

by that: it's not a book that's intended to be read from the beginning to the end in one continuous study.

Rather it is a book to dip into and savour. The author, Bernard E. Jones, has included an excellent list of contents and a detailed index. Almost all that you could ever want to know about Freemasonry, albeit from a very UGLE perspective, can be found therein.

The book is divided up into six main parts: Operative Masonry and the London Company of Freemasonry; How Speculative Freemasonry came into being; the early English Grand Lodges; our Craft Degrees; our Lodges, Lodge officers, Regalia, paraphernalia and festive boards; and Royal Arch, Mark Master and other Degrees.


YLS consists of young professionals from across the Sacramento Region who are committed to serving our community through volunteerism and philanthropy.
